researchers in the innovation hub who include both staff and students have developed other products including Wezhira Wines, Nzviru Jam, herbal mahewu, mealie meal and poultry feed from traditional grains. He also said that in support of vision 2030, the mass production of these products will create employment, affordability and improve the nutritional status of our nation.

He also outlined several researches that the institution has registered. These include agro innovations, that are at varying stages, some of the products include organic fertilisers produced from local heritage based solutions. Researchers have also come up with herbal medicines from locally available indigenous plants in a bid to contribute towards improved health and well being,

These formulations are now ready for both industrialisation and commercialisation. The university is also supplying disinfectants and tailor made garments for the Masvingo community. Community Engagement TRADITIONAL GRAINS CONTRACT FARMING PROGRAMME LAUNCHED

In yet another milestone aimed at ensuring food security within the country and impacting rural livelihoods positively, Great Zimbabwe University's Innovation Centre for Excellence in Dryland Agriculture (ICEDA) launched its novel traditional grains contract farming programme at a colourful ceremony in Chibwedziva, Chiredzi recently.

The launch marked the culmination of a process that commenced in 2022, when the university initiated this programme in the seven districts of Masvingo aimed at encouraging the farming and popularization of traditional varieties of millet, sorghum and sun flower particularly in the arid areas of the Province.

In his key note address, Great Zimbabwe University Vice Chancellor, Professor Rungano Zvobgo noted that the University is supporting farmers in growing traditional grains to improve soil and dietary health and then buying the grain from the farmers when they harvest in order to promote economic growth and stability through agriculture. Professor Zvobgo added that the landmark project speaks to the broader national vision of attaining an upper middle income economy by the year 2030.

The Minister of Higher and Tertiary Education, Innovation, Science and Technology Development Professor Amon Murwira who was the guest of honour highlighted that farmers in southern Zimbabwe are shifting back to growing traditional small grains and maize after experiencing food shortages from the failure of hybrid maize crops, which have not adapted well to the region's dry soils.

Professor Murwira emphasised that the government is in full support of the programme whose overarching goal is to revive seed diversity, rediscover indigenous seed varieties, stop land degradation, and implement a method that works for soils and a changing climate.


Members of the Chibwedziva community expressed their gratitude to the government and Great Zimbabwe University, stating that they are anticipating massive harvests from the project.

Dr Gappah also provided an insightful opinion into the death penalty, highlighting that as an individual she is

vehemently opposed to the penalty which she views as dehumanizing and cruel in its finality, given that it cannot be reversed in the event that new evidence emerges. Prominent playwright Peter Churu and eminent author Dr Tanaka Chidora were in attendance at the debate session with members of Churu's drama group staging an emotional play on the death penalty. Also in attendance was the Dean of the Herbert Chitepo Law School, Mr Victor Nkiwane, Assistant to the Vice Chancellor, Dr Salachi Naidoo, staff and students from the Herbert Chitepo Law School and members of the Kyle College Debate Club. Dr Gappah capped off the day with a donation of books to the participating panellists as well as the Great Zimbabwe University Library.

From the Human Resources Desk ABOUT SICK LEAVE

eave is simply taking an off from work day after informing the management. Leaves are the days that every working person is entitled to and paid for, apart from the holidays. Paid leaves are a part of benefits offered by companies apart from medical claim. There are different types of leave such as maternity, study, sabbatical, ordinary, compassionate and sick leave. In this article we'll look at sick leave and we'll also look at a few ideas on how to properly manage sick leave.

As the name implies, sick leave occurs when an employee gets ill and needs time to recover. An employee is allowed 90 days of sick leave on full pay upon request, supported by a certificate signed by a registered medical practitioner. If the employee has exhausted the 90 days of sick leave in any one-year period of service, they may request a further 90 days of sick leave at half pay.

According to the Labour Act Chapter 28:01 section 14(2), sick leave is an entitlement to every employee. However, employees have abused the sick leave resulting in negative consequences that lead to a toxic relationship with the employer.

There's no level of sickness that applies to everyone here; it really comes down to the individual. "If you're questioning, whether you're well enough to work, that's a good reason to take a sick day. On the other hand, pretending to be sick is a serious violation of company policy. The most important fact that many employees often mistake is that their contract of employment is between them and their employer not with the medical practitioner. In most cases employees have been found on the wrong side of the law when they absent themselves from work, without notifying their employer, after only getting a certificate from a medical practitioner. The fact here is that, 'the medical practitioner recommends that an employee should go on sick leave and the employer grants or approves the sick leave'. In other words, after getting a doctor's certificate, an employee should request for sick leave using the doctor's certificate as a supporting document.

The employer requires an employee to notify the immediate supervisor as soon as possible if you are taking a sick day. If you are severely ill and cannot report to work to notify your supervisor and fill in the sick leave forms, it is helpful if you update your supervisor through a phone call or by sending the sick leave certificate to your supervisor through a relative or a workmate. Giving adequate notice allows your supervisor and colleagues to plan around your absence.

Abuse of sick leave means the misrepresentation of the actual reason for taking sick leave, using sick leave for unauthorized purposes, failure to report sick leave, and may include chronic, persistent or patterned use of sick leave.

Health Tips Stay hydrated during this heat wave.




Stay hydrated - Water is life

ere are tips on how to cope with the current climatic conditions, the experts advised to:

- 1. Drink more water to stay hydrated.
- 2. Keep a water bottle with us to remind us to take water.
- 3. Avoid alcoholic and caffeinated drinks during this time.
- 4. Reduce the consumption of foods high in protein (eg red meats) as they increase metabolic heat.
- 5. Eat fresh fruits and vegetables which are better options.
- 6. Monitor our blood pressure to make sure we are within the normal range.
- 7. Stay indoors (in our home or office) between noon and 3 pm each day as much as possible.
- 8. Take cold water baths before going to bed at night.

Let us therefore strive to comply with it and to share with others.




